

The Peace Plan: Autonomy for Former British Southern Cameroons

A New Approach

Efforts to address this crisis, such as the "special status" granted to Anglophone regions, have failed to deliver meaningful change. Instead, these measures have entrenched the divide, creating a fragile and often dysfunctional framework. The absence of genuine protections for cultural, linguistic, and political rights has reinforced exclusion and fuelled ongoing tensions.

This peace plan, developed by the Alliance for Peace and Justice signals a necessary departure from past approaches. It requires compromise and mutual understanding while remaining steadfast in advocating for the interests and aspirations of the Former British Southern Cameroons. This plan is not a dismissal of grievances but a recognition that lasting peace requires addressing root causes, securing autonomy, and fostering trust between the region and the central government.

Why the Peace Plan Matters

The cost of inaction is too high. Over 700,000 people have been displaced, with thousands more seeking refuge abroad. Schools remain closed, children lose access to education, and families lack essential healthcare. Infrastructure is in ruins, and economic opportunities are scarce.

This peace plan envisions a future of hope:

- For communities displaced by conflict, it promises reintegration, security, and stability.
- For the youth, it offers education, vocational training, and job creation to unlock potential.
- For ex-combatants and political prisoners, it guarantees pathways for reintegration and dignity.
- For the Former British Southern Cameroons, it ensures autonomy, respect for cultural identity, and a roadmap for self-governance.
